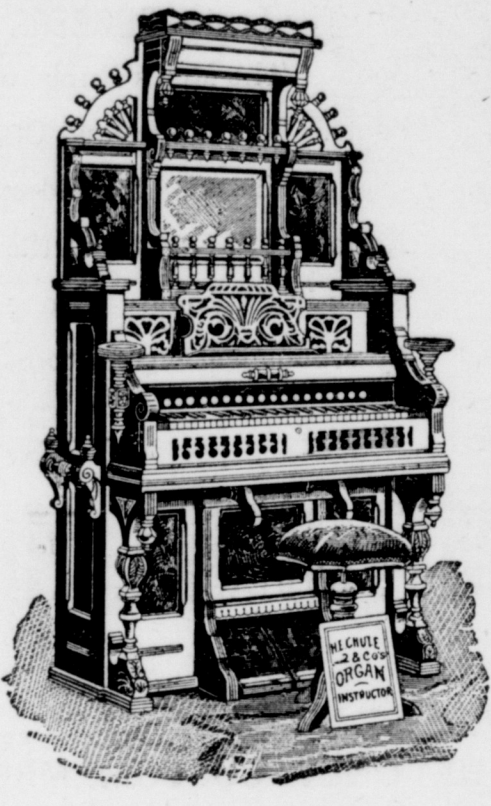
Among the arrivals of last week was that of Mrs. Henrietta Russell, the well known pupil of Delarue and exponent of his art in America.
