

Oldest Picture ln Engiand. The oldest pieture in England is the portrait of Chaucer, who died in 1402, which was probably painted in the low Countries about twenty years before his death. It was discovered in a lumber garret in the house in which Cromwell was born, at Huntingdon, by Sir Richard

Phillips, in 1802. The celebrated collector, Count Truchens, conceived that it was first painted in water colors, and then afterward in oils for preservation; and he certified that the name Chaucer, in the background, was laid on

with the painting. The next portrait in point of antiquity is that of King Henry IV., who began to reign in 1400, and is the property of the Earl of Oxford, and kept in Hampton Court, in Herefordshire.
