Jellied Cherries.

Preserved cherries are best for this, so I will begin by a recipe for preserving them. Take the wax cherries, which keep the color and shape better than any other varicty, and stone carefully. Make a syrup of the juice which comes from stoning them, and sugar (pound to pound of fruit,) and boil it thick before you put in the cherries. It is almost superfluous to say that these should have been chosen for color and perfectness. When the cherries are nearly done, take them out, put on a flat dish, the syrup boiling gently the while, and only after they are entirely cool, put them again into the syrup to boil a short time together. Such preserved cherries will not be the less pretty if the syrup is slightly candied over them. Dissolve 1 box of jelly in a pint of cold water. Add 3 pints boiling water and flavor with lemon. Put in a cool place to congeal, and when it begins to stiffen drop in the cherries which will show beautifully through the amber jelly. The jelly should cool in a dish which will mold it prettily.

Electric Cars Without Track. Scientific discovery and application bids fair to change the whole appearance of civilized cities. For years one of the sights of London has been the great "Pickford" fans. Every tourist who carried a picture of the London streets in his memory, saw the sleek, handsome horses, and the well set up vehicles of this express company. But electricity is doing away with them.

In outward appearance the new van is

much like the old ones, except that there

are no horses.

The "drivers" seem to know how to manage them admirably, and how to set The storage batteries which furnished

van, and a recharged set may be substituted in two minutes. The van is lighted by electricity and is controlled by a single switch, which is regulated by the left hand of the driver, and runs up, if necessary, to a speed of fitteen miles an hour. The right hand of the driver is free to turn a steering wheel, which is provided with a pointer, indicating the direction in which the vehicle is going. The steering gear has ball bearings, which give perfect control with a minimum effort. It is estimated that the cost of running electric vans equal to two horse vehicles, including charging, maintenance, etc., will be four cents a mile, and each charge will give about thirty miles
