Had it not been for the very sad drowning accident Mr. D. Russell Jack's picnic would have been one of the pleasantest functions of the season, but just as the grounds around the camp at Rothesay were being lighted up with lanterns preparatory to spending the remainder of the evening, the whole party was thrown into consternation by hearing that one of their number had been drowned in the Kennebecasis. Mr. Ernest S. Ruel who together with his two brothers had been camping at Rothesay the three races were held, a double scull rowing race, a four paddle canoe race and a single canoe race, each participant to paddle standing up in his canoe. Mr. Ruel took part in each of these, being the winner of the last, and worked very hard to gain a victory. After the races he started in his canoe for his camp at Henderson's point intending to change his clothes and return to the picnic. Mr. Harry Puddington also started for the camp and on their way across Mr. Ruel proposed a little race. After a few minntes Mr. Puddington, not hearing the stroke of his associate's paddle turned round and to his horror, found the cance empty floating on the water. Mr. William Davidson who was on the river at the time also noticed the canoe without an occupant and started to it in his rowboat at full speed; he saw the body floating and shouted to Mr. Ruel to keep swimming till he came to the rescue but the body eank immediately. An alarm was given at once and a search for the body begun. The accident happened about 8 o'clock and it was 4 o'clock before the body was recovered. Dr. Walker who examined the pour was of the opinion that death resulted from over exertion and not by drowning as when found the body was in the position he would have had when paddling and had position he would have had when paddling and had no appearance of struggling from drowning. Mr. Ruel was the third and youngest son of Mr. J. R. Ruel, Collector of Customs for this port. He was in the 22nd year of his age, was of a manly and unselfish disposition.
