

HALIFAX.

The event of the week in society circles has been the arrival of Lord and Lady Aberdeen and the 'vic reception. The reply of Aberdeen to the civic

ad. 's was as follows: Your h or, Mr. Mayor, ladies and gentlemen: It is with. 'lings of deep appreciation and much pleasure that I eccive this address, expressing as it does in no uncertain manner and in language both emphatic and graceful your loyalty towards the Queen and your good will towards Her Majesty's representative. Such a manifestation would under any circumstances in its first aspect be appropriate and in the second aspect agreeable, but especially is this the case when such an utterance, such a manifestation is received from the representatives of a city and a community which occupies so prominent a position as that of Halifax, both in the past and present life of British North America and indeed of the British empire as a whole. I can assure you, Mr. Mayor, that both Lady Aberdeen and I will always remember with grateful feeling the assurances contained in this address. You may be very sure also that if any person should be familiar something more than the name of the historic province of Nova Scotia I ought to be one of those, not only because I ciaim to be a native of the older Scotia, but because I think that the earliest distinction and title which was received in my family was that of the baronetcy of Nova Scotia. (Applause.) You can imagine therefore that this circumstance has added to the interest and appreciation with which I have looked forward coming to see something of this land, with which I can thus claim some hereditary connection. (Applause.) Hitherto I have not been able to ascertain whether this designation carries with it any special privileges, still less, whether in conveys any emolument. (Laughter.) I am in hopes, however, that some light may be thrown upon this subject, even should it be necessary to ask the premier of the pro-vince to introduce a bill for this purpose. (Laughter.) I suppose, gentlemen, such a bill might be designated as one for the relief of the governor general. (Renewed laughter.) Meanwhile I hope to take full advantage of such other privileges as I may enjoy here, not only in the official capacity but privately, as for the time being a resident in this city or district. I do not propose on this occasion to make any general observations on the circumstances and public topics suggested by such an expression as that which I had the honor of receiving at your hands. I am, of course, a newcomer, and I am here as an observer and learner, and I hope to profit by being a member of this community for a while, especially as regards that most effective method of instruction, amely conversation with the ladies and most infuential men who are best able to give information regarding the history, resources and the institutions or your province. Such being the case you may be sure that Lady Aberdeen and I will have good reason to be glad that we have this opportunity of becoming your guests and fellow residents. I cannot help alluding further to one fact, namely, that although we have heard much of the attractions and charms of this city and its sur-roundings, their realization has far exceeded our roundings, their realization has far exceeded our expectation. Indeed I cannot but quote a remark made by Mr. Emmerson after he had visited a celebrated spot in the United States. "This," he said, is "the only place that I have seen that came up to the brag," (Laughter). I am sure that a similar observation may be applied to Halifax. (Applause.) I may also be allowed to remark that with special feelings of satisfaction and pleasure we with special feelings of satisfaction and pleasure we observed the extremely hearty manner in which your citizens evinced their public spirit and loyalty, and also their cordial hospitality, by the manner in which they greeted us on our arrival in this city, and this morning. We have observed very much in terest, also, in the pleasing and attractive manner in which this sentiment has been displayed by flag ecorations in the streets, a display which has been

further elaborated in the charming floral and other adornments within these walls. Let me add that the expressions which you have made use of towards Lady Aberdeen are felt by her extremely. I am sure I cannot imagine anything more encouraging to those occupying a position of responsibility and trust, to endeavor to discharge rightly the duties of such a position, than assurances of confidence and good feeling, such as those which you have now uttered. To you, Mr. Mayor and colleagues of the conneil, I beg to express my hearty good wishes, in your administration of muniripal affairs for the welfare of the city.




