Observer—The girls married outsiders who would buy their pretty bonnets, and the boys married girls who wore pretty bonnets.

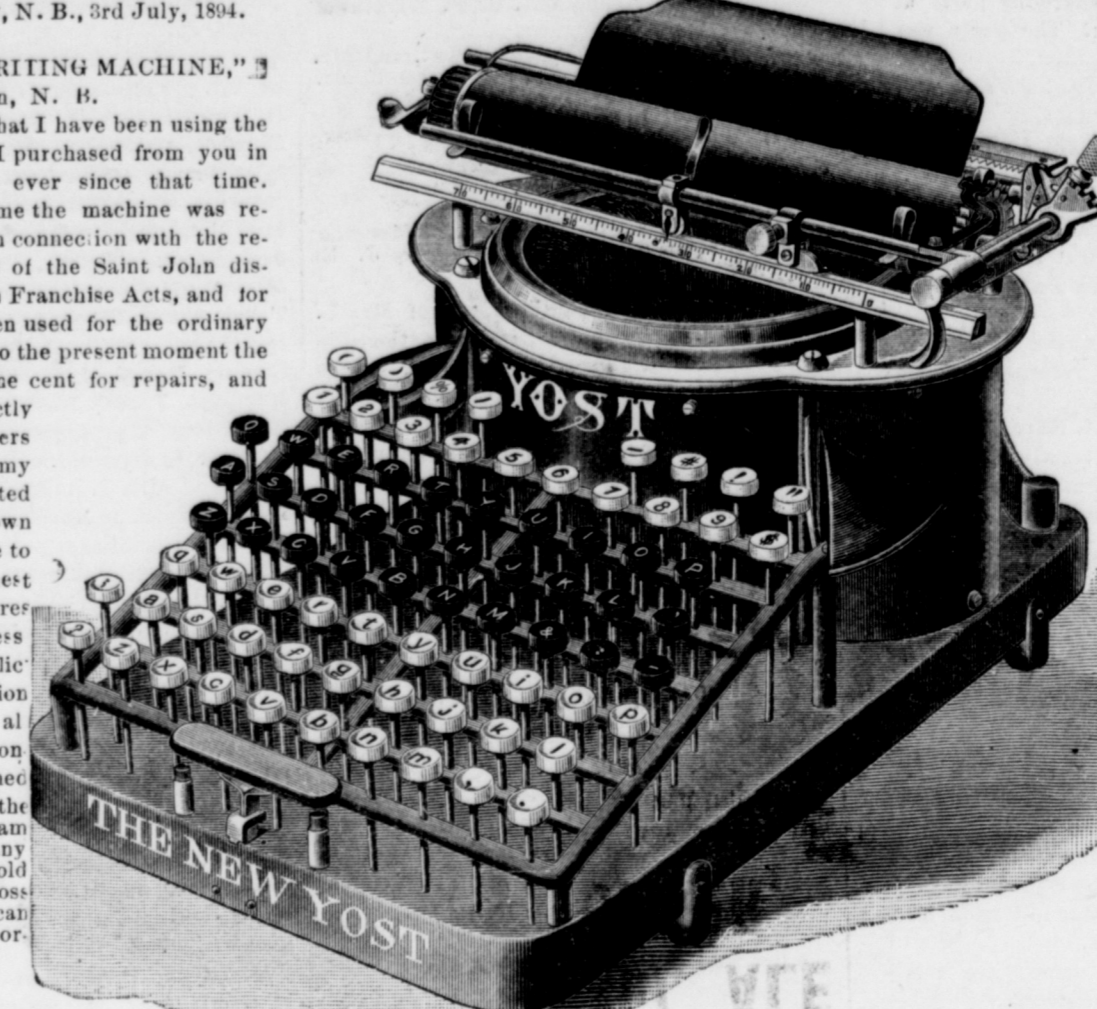
