LADIES' COLLEGE NOTES.

SACKVILLE, May 2 .- A cut of the new art building has appeared in one or two of the rapers but its small size prevents full justice being done to this beautiful piece of architecture. Those who know say it will be one of the finest in Canada, not judging by size of course. The style is Byzantine, of which St, Mark's Venice, is a well known example, and will be carried out in olive green stone. The two rows of pillars across the front are Grecian and the broad frieze above will be wrought in terra cotta, giving a very rich effect. The front is adorned with a pediment supported by pillars and will face on York street, thereby giving a northern light to the studio, which will be situated at the back of the building, the three galleries occupying the main part. The students are looking forward with great interest to its completion as it will add greatly to their comfort and facilities for working. The whole place will be heated by a large wood furnace, a new kiln for the china painting is to be provided and electric lights will be used when necessary.

Owing to lack of space only about one third of the pictures belonging to the Owen's art gallery trust have been seen and the public are waiting in hopes of having them soon shown to advantage in the new galleries. Old Lingley, renamed Victoria hall, has been used all winter as a studio, but will be cleared out for the closing exercises of the university. Students say they would not feel as if they had properly graduated, unless they received their diplomas in the old hall, under the portrait of the beloved founder. The paintings, will, for the most part be left on the walls, but the students work will be exhibited in Beethoven hal!
