MAITLAND.

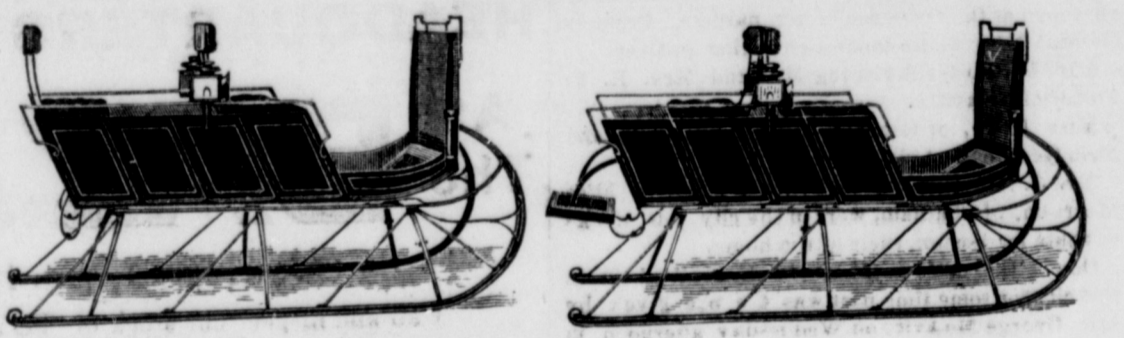
