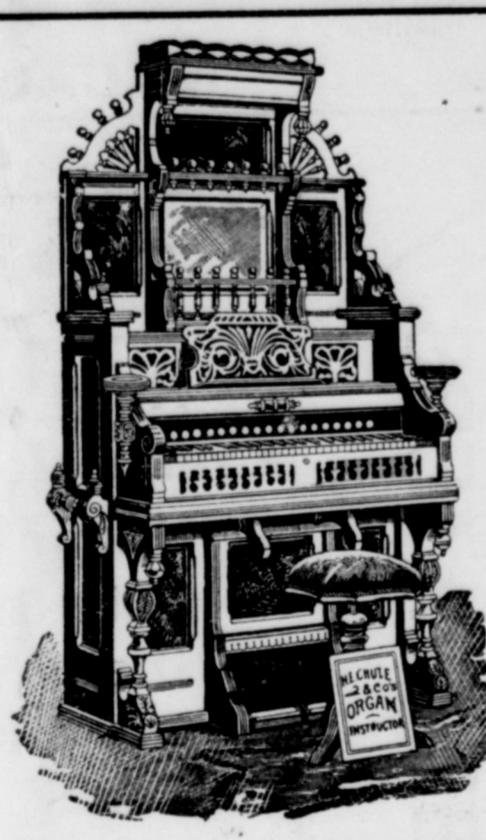
NEW GLASGOW.
