Mr. George Niles and his family have moved from Indiantown, to the house lately owned by Fred Tapley, on Douglas avenue. NYDIA.

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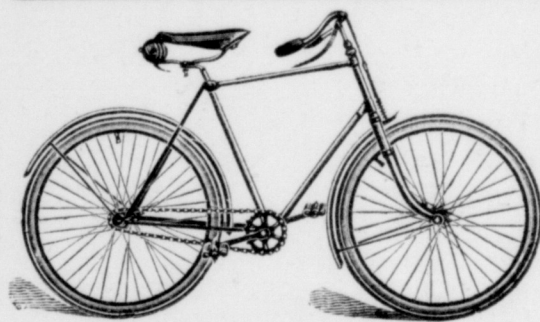
