The death of the Hon. Michael J. Power occurred at his late residence on Friday last. He has been in ill health for some years, and for the past few months has been confined to the house. He was a native of this city, and a son of the late Mr. Michael Power, of Waterford, Ireland. He has been a prominent business man, upright and straightforward in all his dealing with men, and had many personal friends who well knew his sterling qualities. The functal took place from his son's residence, Lucknow terrace on Monday afternoon, and, notwithstanding the dlsagreeable weather, was very largely attended. The procession was headed by Marshal John Kennedy, followed by the Halifax fire department, the veteran Firemen's association, the Union Protection company, Union fire company, and the Charitable Irish society.
