

It was an "Olla podrida" indeed, and the extent and variety of the different features must have necessitated an immense amount of labor on the part of Miss Hudson and her attendant nymphs. The opening piece was a Japanese fan drill and dance in which the Mikado, are represented, Miss Maggie Willett t ok part assisted by twelve of the fairest ladies of his court-Mrs. W. B. The costumes were very beautiful, and the make up of the ladies themselves so perfect that a native of Japan might well have been deceived at the first glance. The stage presented a most bright and charming difficult motions of the drill with unerring precision.
