Rising at the accustomed time or a trifle earlier on Sunday morning is one secret of a rest-Sunday morning nap, and a few minutes rest and sleep just after dinner will prove more beneficial than twice that time spent hurry and worry all day to compensate for

The children should be instructed to arrange the beds to air before leaving their rooms, and then no time will be lost in making them up after breaktast. If the house has had its usual Friday's sweeping and the living rooms are carefully put to rights on Saturday before retiring, the carpet sweeper can be hastily run over the sitting and dining-room floors on Sunday morning and the dust wiped from the furniture where necessary, and the house-

Every housekeeper should so arrange her work that she can attend public worahip at least once each Sabbath. It will be more beneficial in a physical as well as a spiritual sense than to stay at home all day with the plea that "it is a day of rest."
