The magnificent Victoria Regia, or American water-lily, known better as the Amazon or Royal lily, has its home, as the name indicates, in the Amazon river. It has been called by botanists' the most beautiful plant in the world,' and it is said that when the student Haenke first saw it, 'he fell upon his knees in a transport of admiration.' The leaves, measuring sometimes six feet in diameter, are of a beautishining gr en, with a raised margin as they float upon the water of from three to five inches, the under part of which is colored deep crimson. Their rapid growth is phenomenal in the plant world. often and it is said that they increase eight inches in diameter in a single day.
