#### BISMARKIANA.

Some Good Storles Concerning this Famous Man.

A letter which, according to the datestamp, was posted in Berlin on the 1st April, bore the simple address : "To Him." The clerk at the post-office wrote underneath, "Probably to His Highness Prince Bismarck," nor was he mistaken. It was a letter of respectful congratulation to the ex-Chancellor.

The circle of Bismarck's admirers extends far beyond the limits of Germany, or even Europe. An American lady was so enamoured of the great chancellor that she longed for a personal memento of him. To this end she wrote Bismarck a letter, asking for a lock of his hair. The letter was returned to the transatlantic fair one with a marginal note in the veteran-statesman's own hand : "Totally impossible!"

The representative of a foreign power who was no great tavorite of the Chancellor was admitted to an audience with Bismark. A secretary of the Foreign Office was waiting in the ante-room. At last the diplomatist came out, fanning himself with his handkerchief, and said :-

"It is past bearing; Bismark is puffing away all the time, and the very strongest cigars into the bargain. I had to ask his permission to open a window."
