MAY 22—An unqualified success was "Hispania" the comic opera given by amateurs on Friday and Saturday nights of last week. Full houses greeted the performers both nights and a packed one for the matinee on Saturday afternoon. He was the head and front of it all. He wrote the libretto, designed and looked after the making of the costumes and stage management, a large contract! He must have had much hard work, but he was repaid for all his trouble, by the success of the performances. With Mr. Compton, as musical director, the orchestra was a capital one, he shares with Mr. Greenwood the honors of the piece. Mr. Hebb, the leading lady as "Queen Isabella" took the house by storm, his acting and singing were worthy of a good professional actor. His gown of late satin was extremely handsome and the long train added grace to the wearer, if it did occasionally cause him trouble. His singing was much appreciated his "Promise Me" sung with amusing words made a "hit." The other lady's part was played by Mr. Frank Salter, "Pansy," and the Queen's maid. A capital maid he was and he danced much better than any maid of my acquaintance. Arthur Duffus made a good king, he had a great deal to do in his scenes with the cook was most amusing. The members of the first and second acts and in the second they were equally as attractive as the first.

The four conspirators were all well represented. Mr. W. E. Mitchell was the leader of the quartet the best actor, he sings also as well as the actor. Another good actor was Mr. W. E. Thompson; I should fancy from the many little stage tricks he had that it was not by any means his first appearance before the footlights. Mr. Frank B. Bennett's sweet voice was heard in the "Dusty Miller" and so well did he sing that the audience insisted on an encore. Mr. C. Moore, was heard for the first time in solo work his song "Dear Heart" was the best rendered one of the evening. Sixteen policemen gave a pretty march during the second act, which was demanded again. Messrs. Wells, Baunster, and Frank DeMille all had small parts which they well filled. All the characters were good not one weak one. The costumes were particularly handsome and the colors blended most beautifully. After Saturday's performance Mrs. W. N. Wickwire had a large supper party. Miss K. H. M. Mori, Miss Bullock, Miss L. G. Mori, Miss O. Mori, Messrs. Austen, Jones, Gyles, Elliott and Ouphan were among the guests. Mrs. John Taylor Wood has invitations out for a dance to be given on Friday evening. The Orpheus club gave their third and last concert on Tuesday night. The feature of the evening was Miss Lottie Mae MacKay's singing. Miss MacKay is a niece of Mr. Thomas Mitchell of this city, and has been studying music for some years in the States. Her voice is particularly sweet soprano and very flexible. Her first number was a "cavatina" by "Donizetti" for an encore she gave the favorite "The Last Rose of Summer." "The Three Maidens Prayer" was her second song, she pronounced most distinctly which is certainly a great addition to all good singing. Just before this song she was presented with a beautiful bunch of roses. As her third selection she gave a "Rondo and recitation" by "Mattozzi," it was perhaps the best of all her number, and she was encored again and gave "Home Sweet Home" in response. Miss MacKay wore a very handsome pink silk gown which was most becoming. The Orpheus club gave a part song of which the words were the best part and was not sung by any means up to the club's usual standard. The club's orchestra played twice, a march by "Beriz" and a "Sarabande" by Bach-Fitzhagen. A Russian part song "Oh Tell It Her" by the ladies auxiliary without an accompaniment was extremely pretty well sung. A Dutch "Lullaby" by the club, ladies auxiliary and orchestra was good. Miss MacKay sang a soprano obbligato to it. Mr. Max Mack's violin solo was (a) Berceuse slave, (b) Perpetua Mobie, his playing is always liked by the audience and as usual was encored, and the little piece he played was better liked than either of his other numbers. The last number on the program was a "Ballad" sung by the whole club with orchestra, Miss Lewis sang the solo part. It was a short one and not extremely pretty, one was sorry not to hear her in something more taking as her voice is delightful to listen to. The club began practicing next week for the choruses to be sung at the Sousa band concert. The choruses are to be from the "Creation," "Redemption" Messiaen and Elijah.

Mr. W. S. Hawkins opened his engagement on Monday night at the Academy, he had a very good house to welcome him, and was warmly received himself when he first came on the stage. Mr. Whitecar another Halifax favorite is of the company, also his wife. "The Lost Paradise" and "Lost in New York" are the two plays they are presenting this week.
