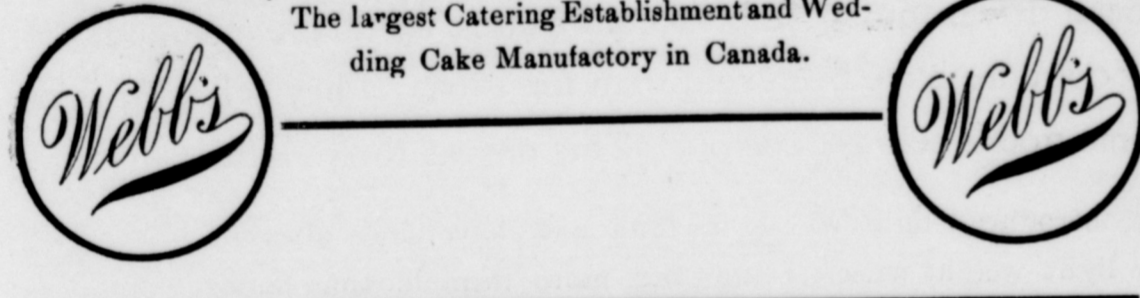

The Sporting Prophet. Many jokes have been made at the expense of the sporting prophet, who, however, survives in spite of his prophecies.

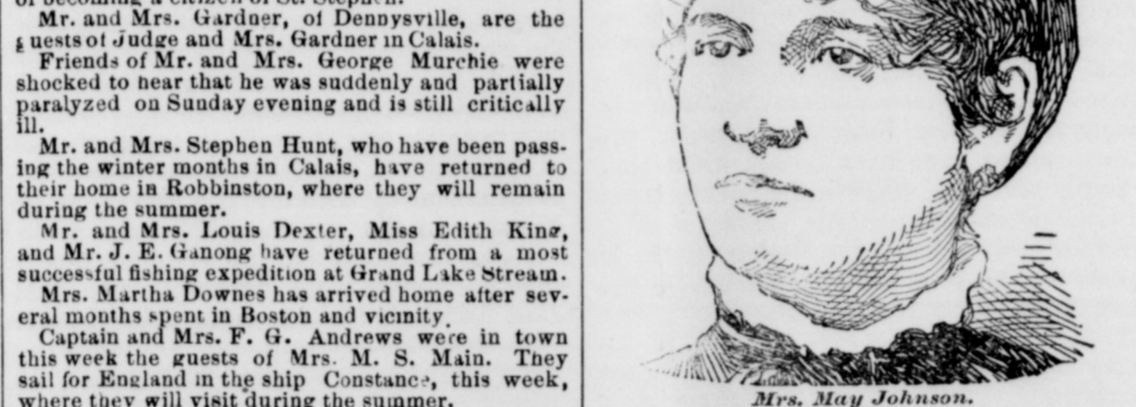
During one season Dr. Shorthouse had a paper that said six prophets writing in his hand had been seven starters.
