The social world is very dull-that is for the grown ups though the younger portion of society who were home for the holidays had a very gay time of it. The weather has been very cold so that a bright pleasant fireside was preferable to going out skating-about the only merriment we are indulging in at present. Both the Dartmouth lakes and Williams' lake have been thronged with skaters every afternoon, though the distance to the latter lake kept fainted-hearted people away. Most of the men who go in for outdoor skating play hockey with great energy, and on Monday and Tuesday it was indeed the only way to keep warm. A fortnight sgo the devotces of this game played without any coats and with a noble display of white shirt sleeves.

The private afternoons began last Friday and in spite of the falling snow there was a large attendance. It is said that a larger number than usual have joined this year which will make things very crowded. In spite of the storm many new winter costumes made their appearance on that occasion notably a very pretty and well made brown cloth costume, with small to que to match. Another very pretty costume was of dark green, with trimmings of velvet and fur. Quite a number ot bright reds made their appearance, and helped to give a warm effect. Also a number were wearing blue of the new shade, which is at present so fashionable.

The Berkshire band, which played in the rink for the first time, kept very good waltzing time which was as agreeable, as it was surprising, as everyone expected there would be some trouble just at first about the time. There nearly always is as the time is different to that played for waltzing on the floor. The red uniforms of the bandsmen looked very mart, a thing, which one does not often see at the link, the weather usually being so severe that they have to keep on their heavy

overcoats. Tea was served as usual in spite of the many gloeny prephecies which had been made about to probable absence; there was a scarcity of dancng men cwing to the large number of beginners but dancing was kept up with much spirit. Quite a catastrophe has pened, just as the band struck up to announce the lancers the electric lights suddenly went out, and the rink was lest in total darkness. Everyone's partner had to be found, and the difterent sets had to be formed in complete darkness. The only lights in the rink being the gas jets above the bard stand, which only served to "make the darkness visible." However, in spite of the general confusion which prevailed, when the lights came on again, everyone was discovered in his or her place waiting for the band to commence-which it pro : p. ly did, when light enough had been thrown on to show that the sets were properly formed.
