Sept. 16.—The event of the week was of course the meet of the M. P. A. A. which took place on Saturday afternoon at the Athletic grounds, and which proved successful beyond the most sanguine expectations. The day dawned bright and hot as July, and long before the hour fixed for the sports nearly every seat was occupied and the gam. rel. was given beyond any point touched before.

In the history of the M. P. A. A. and the spirits of the boys had risen accordingly, for who does not love to play to a full house?
