Clarence Webster of Edinburgh University. Dr. Webster has had the good fortune on the eve of his return to Canada to obtain another high honor. At the last meeting of the Royal College of Physicians he received from the president a fifty-guinea prize for original research. This is the second time that Dr. Webster has won the same prize, and he is the only competitor who has won it twice. The prize goes to the graduate of the college who presents the best thesis based on original investigation. Dr. Webster's theme was Human Embryology.
