Aug. 5.—One of the saddest fatalities that has
 ever happened in Moncton occurred last Wednes-
 day afternoon when Eddie Crowhurst, youngest
 son of Mr. William Crowhurst of the I. C. R. shops
 was drowned in the Petitcodiac river below the
 Covebridge bridge. The lad who was but thirteen
 years old went down to the river to bathe, accom-
 panied only by two boys younger than himself. He
 could swim a little but was apparently unaware of
 the dangerous nature of the river, especially at the
 point where he went in, and walked towards the
 channel until the water reached his shoulder, when
 he suddenly lost his footing and was carried out
 into deep water. The tide was scarcely half in, and
 the current being terribly swift the boy was borne
 rapidly up the river but retained his presence of
 mind and kept afloat for several minutes manfully
 endeavoring to reach the shore, but without mak-
 ing any headway. When he realized his peril he
 called for help, but as the boys on shore were
 unable to swim they could only wade out
 towards him, and shout for help. As there was no
 one within call except one man who paid no atten-
 tion to their cries, the poor little lad sank for
 the last time, and his terrified companions rushed
 with the sad news. The body was recovered next
 morning, having been carried to Fox Creek by the
 next tide.

Little Freddie was a particularly bright, attrac-
 tive boy and a general favorite. As one of the young-
 est members of a family noted for their devotion to
 each other it will be readily imagined that his sad
 and sudden death has been a crushing blow to the
 survivors, and his heart broken parents have the
 sympathy of the entire community.

The funeral took place on Saturday afternoon
 from St. George's church, and was very largely at-
 tended, the services being performed by Rev. E.
 Bertram Hooper. The pall bearers were all young
 boys, Walter Pittfield, C. McClintock, Charlie
 Busby, S. Bradbury, H. Janowyc and Fred Scott.

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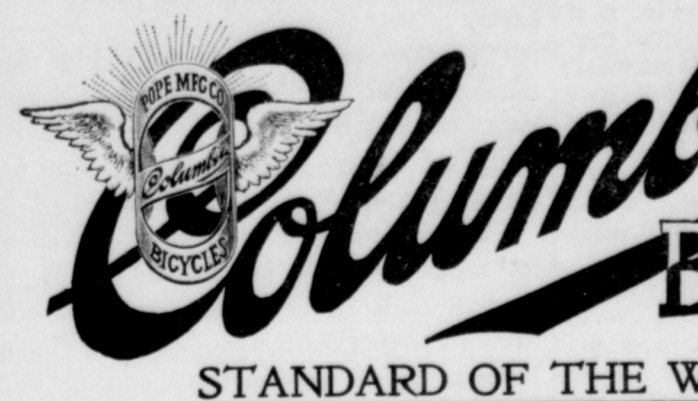
