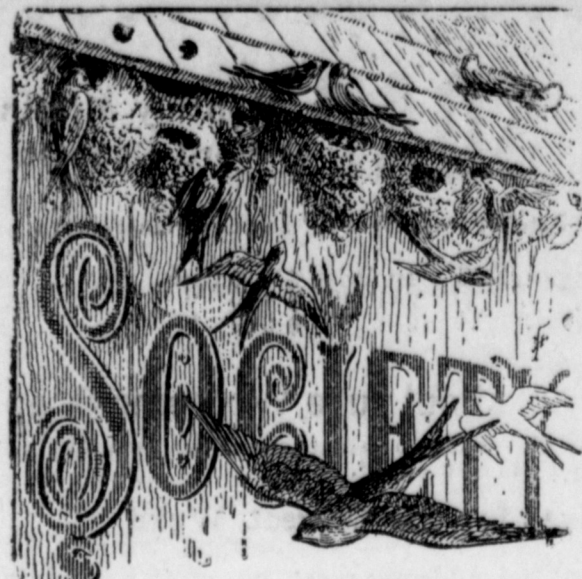

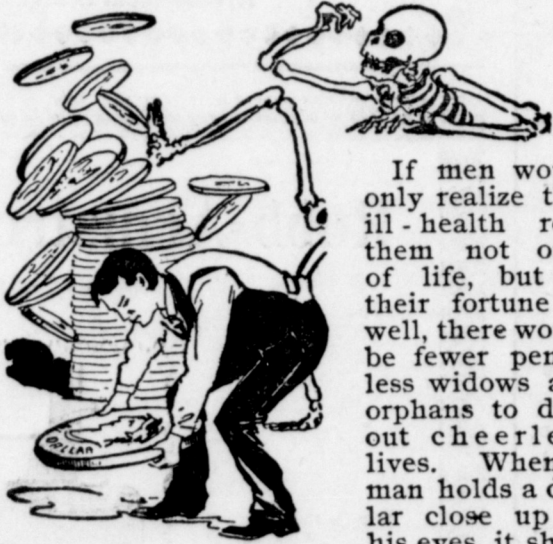
Mrs. N. W. Brown has been quite ill. Her mother, Mrs. Bishop was nursing her. She has gone to her former home in Albert Co. for a change.
