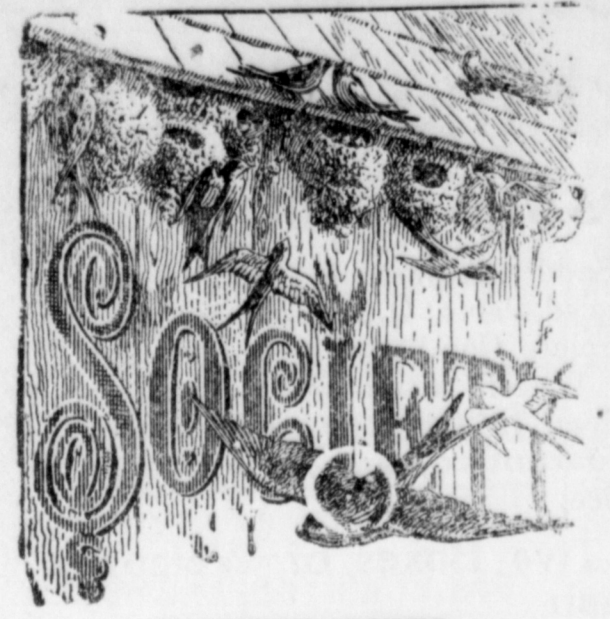

A cosy little tea gathering consisting of eight young ladies, besides the house party was ventured upon last week by Mrs. E. K. Spilney.

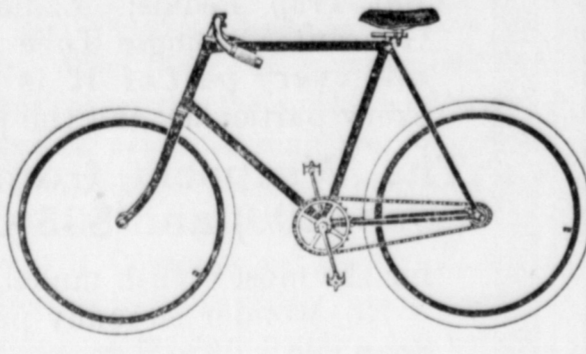
Then again on Saturday evening, although stormy and forboding, a most delightful little "whit waist dance" was tendered by Miss Susie Brown.

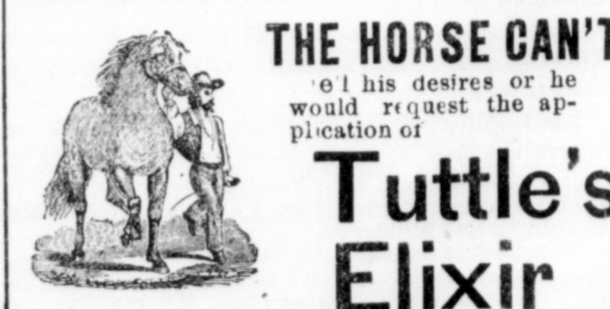
