Evans Williams had a different experience; the real fact being as an American critic remarks about him that he sings right into the heart. Of Mary Louise Clary's triumphs here it is hardly necessary to speak. They are, like Williams', still fresh in the public mind, as is the memory of her phenomenal voice with its rich, marvellous power. I saw a little reference to this great contralto the other day. It is not of recent origin but was made upon the occasion of an appearance in New York in 1893. The extract is from the New York Times of April 3 and says: "This young wom in has been gifted by nature with the most imposing contralto voice we have heard since the days of Annie Louise Clary whose place the operatic stage has not yet been ble to fill. The registers of her voice are perfectly fequalized and her execution of scale passages is flawless. It is one of those contraltos of power and quality which come along only occasionally.
