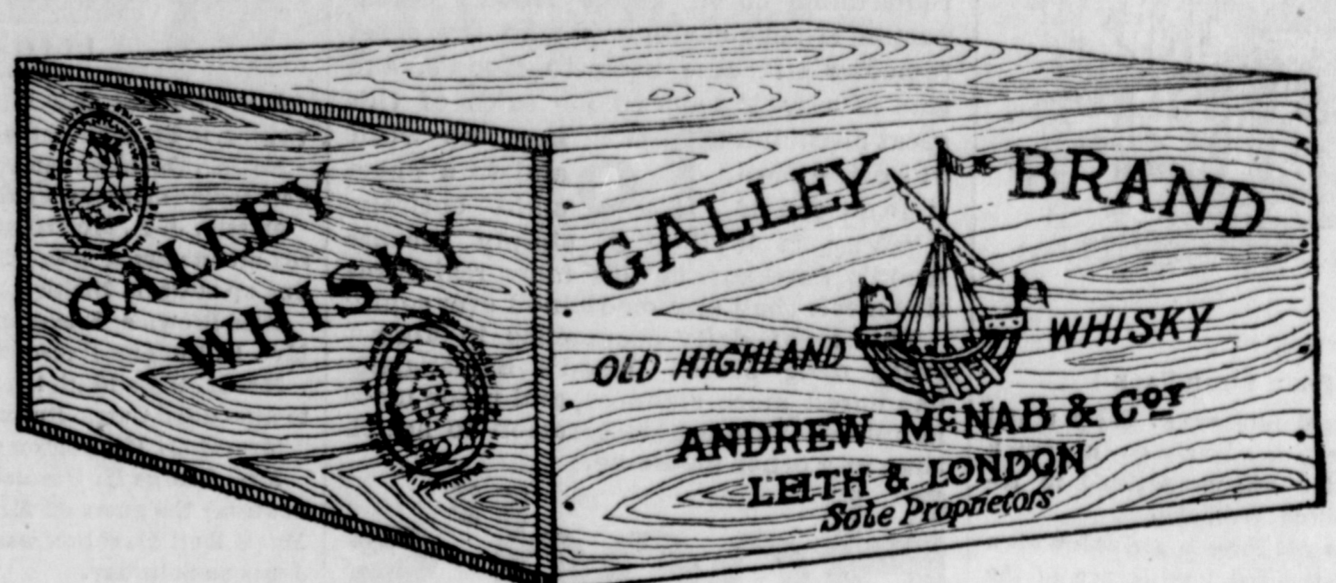
Open's orchestra, stationed in the eastern parlor rendered fine dance music, and with the highly waxed hard wood floors made dancing a thorough enjoyment.
