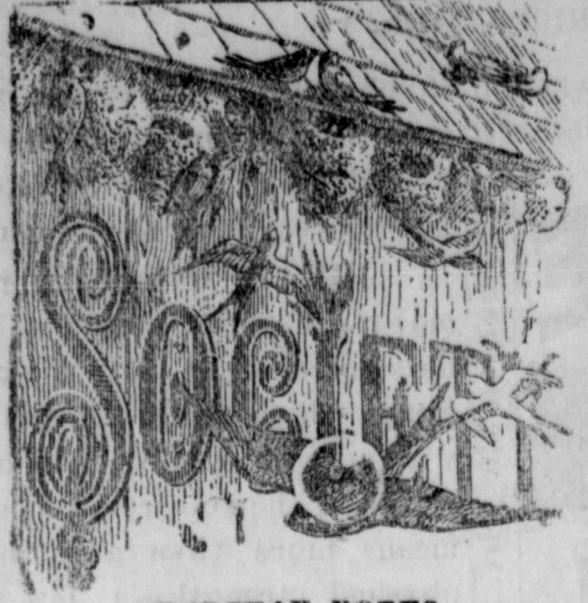

Dec 7.—Mrs. John Dick has returned from a very pleasant visit with her daughter Mrs. R. Knox of Mecklenburg St. St. John.

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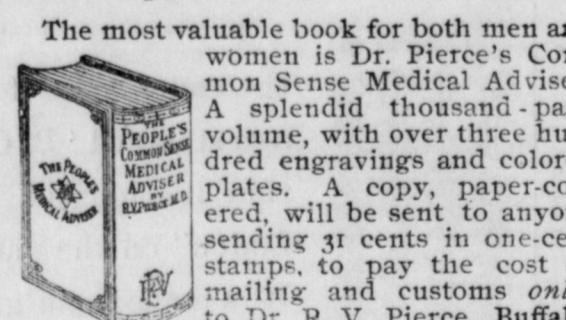
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The man may be able to whip the lion single-handed, but he is not taking chances, and is not going to disdain the assistance of helpers with hot irons.
