THE VULTURE OL LAMBS.

It is a Rare Bird and may Soon Become Wholly Extinct.

It appears that birds of prey are not so rare in the Europeans mountains as is generally supposed. A teacher of Belegiers, in the district of Dignie, in Fr ance, was hunting not long ago in the mountain in the outskirts of the village. He saw on a rock t wo birds of prey devouring a lamb. He took sim at one of them and was fortunate enough to knock it over at the first shot. It was a "bearded gy paete," the vulture of lamb. This bird, formerly so common in the Pyrenoes, the high mountain of the Tyrol, of Switzerland, of Germany, of Corscia, and of Sardinia, has almost disppeared from Europe. So the capture made by M. Martin is o'

scientific interest. The bird was sent to the lacoratoay at Marseilles. It is a beautiful specimen of the species. The span of the wings measures two metres 80 centimetres. The length of the back to the extremity of the tail, one m eter 20 centimeters, and weighs over six kilo

grammes. Its plumage is black on the upper parts, marked with a longitudinal white line at the centre of each feather on the back, and of the superior and inferior coverings of the wings. The large feathers of he wings and tail are of an iron gray tint; some measure 70 centimeters in length and 11 in width

The head is white, or unmented with two black bands, which, meeting at the base of the beak, mount to the forehead by following the or its of the eyes, where they form eyebrows. Under the beak is a brush of bristles, black and stiff, of four centimeters, forming a beard, and giving the bird a peculiar expression.

The stomach of the gypaete contained the hair, nails of a hare relled into a ball, also the humerous and a shoulder blade of a sheep. This bird will have a place in the Museum of Natural Science of Marseilles.
