### IN A PLANT PRISON.

A plant is cultivated in New Zealand which has the singular property of destroying the moths that infest vegetation. It produces a large number of whitish flowers of an agreeable odour, which attracts insects. On a summer evening may be seen plants covered with moth, which by the following morning have quite disappeared. The action of the flower is entirely mechanical. The calyx is deep and the nectar is placed at its base. Attracted by the sight and perfume of this nectar, the moth penetrates into the calyx and pushes forward its proboscis to get the food, but before it is able to do this it is seized between two jaws that guard the passage, and that keep the insect a prisoner until it dies.
