WEYMOUTH, N. S.

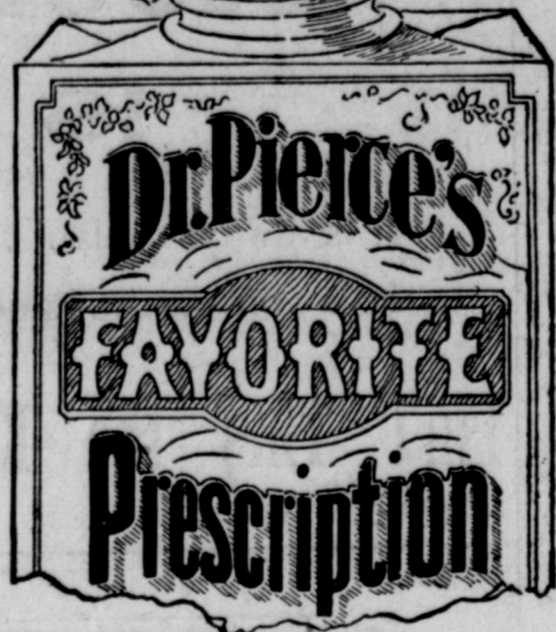
