Teed was elected president; Mr. Raymond of Woodstock and Mr. Fraser of Grand Falls, vice-presidents, and Rev. G. F. Scovill, secretary. A very excellent paper on the "Preparation of the teacher for S. S. work," written by Rev. A. W. Teed was read by Rev. F. Scovill; also one equally as interesting by Ven. 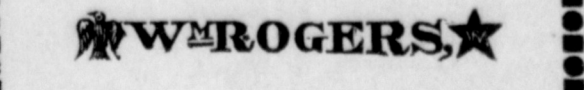
