The spectacular extravaganza, Zephra, presented at the opera house during the present week has been a grand success. At every performance the seating capacity has been taxed to the utmost limit and indications are that for this afternoon and evening, seats will be at a premium. As an amateur effort Zephra is away ahead of anything ever produced in this city, The stage settings and scenery are splendid, the choruses perfectly drilled and the dozens of pretty and graceful girls executed their various parts in the dances and marches with perfect precision and ease, which plainly showed the result of thorough and painstaking practice. 
