Aluminum for Soldering Rails.

Among the uses recently found for aluminum is the soldering of iron rails end to end in order to obtain a smooth, continuous track. Aluminum has the property of producing great heat in the act of combining with oxygen. The ends of the rails are placed together in a crucible filled with a mixture of aluminum and iron ore. The mixture being fired, an intense heat results, and the rails are firmly soldered together. This is said to be quite as efficacious as the electric method of soldering.

Sunshine and Sugar.

The experiments of the French grape-growers in Algeria have shown that too much sunshine is unfavorable for the making of good wine. In the more temperate climate of France grapes possess a proper proportion of sugar to acid for wine-making, but the hot Algerian sunshine induces so active an assimilation by the vines that the quantity of acid is reduced and that of sugar is increased. In consequence the wine makers of Algeria are driven to many devices for improving the flavor and lasting quality of their wines.
