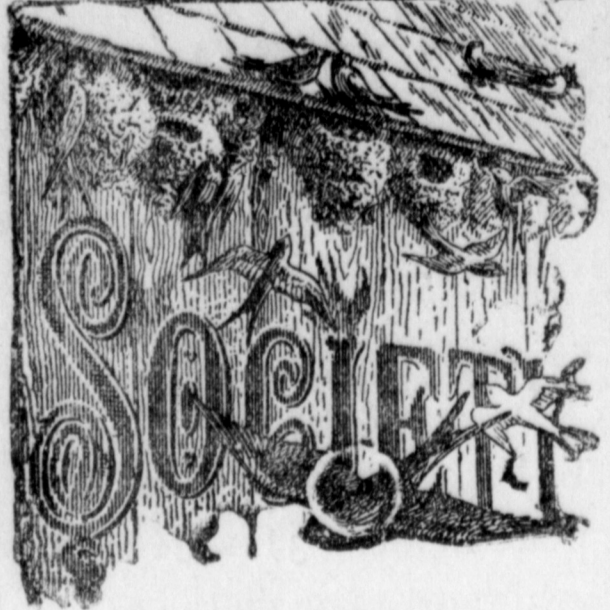

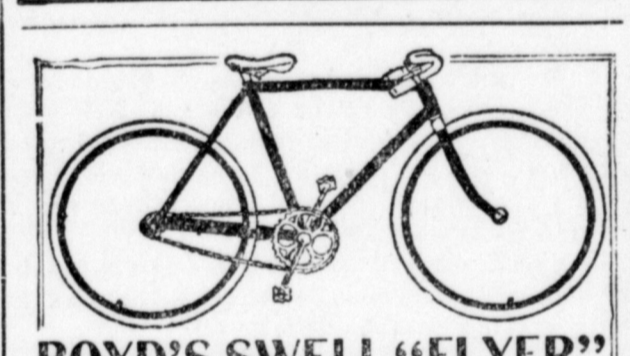
Miss Eliza Keys, Northesk, left last week for Providence, R. I., where she enters a hospital, with the view of becoming a trained nurse.

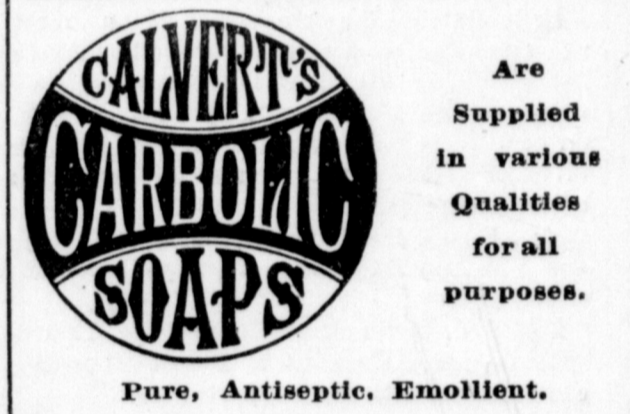
