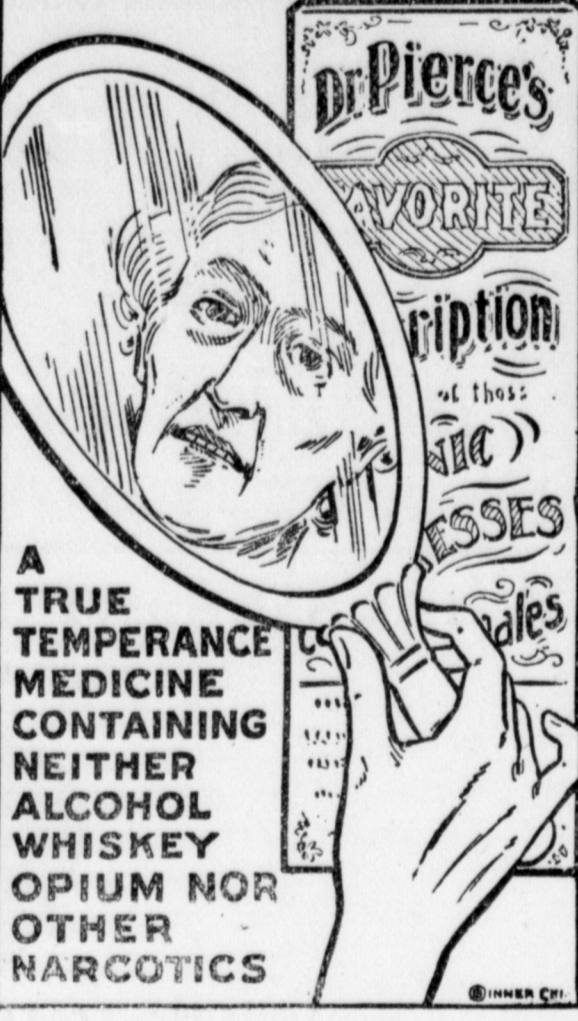

His Handicap.

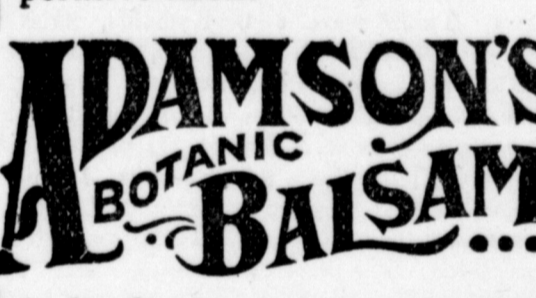

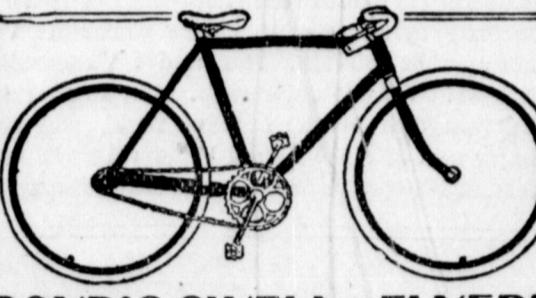
