McL sughlin, on trial at St. Andrews charged with murder, was Monday found not guilty and discharged.

At a meeting held Ssturday night in Sussex the conservatives nominated Dr. G. N. Pearson as candidate for councillor for the Parish of Sussex at the coming muni cipal elections. Dr. Pearson has accepted the nomination.

steam r Hating, from Skagway to Vancover, went ashore Saturday afternoon at Tucker's bay, Jarvis Island, and is now hard and fast on the rocks. The place is a small rocky inlet, lying to the north east of Luquette island at the entrance to Sabine strait, 40 miles north of Vancouver B. C. When the steamer went ashore Capt. Goose was on the watch. The Hating had on board 170 passengers of whom 130 were first class and 40 second class. There was no panic and the passengers were soon made aware that no danger was to be apprehended.

The most destructive fire in the history of Los Gatos, near San Jose, Cal, occurred early Sunday morning. The entire business section of the town was wiped out. The loss is estimated from \$100,000 to \$150,000. A dezen business blocks, several manufactories, a livery stable, a church and many dwellings were burned.
