Miss August Keans and Mr C L Hay of Chelsea are the guests of Mr and Mrs Haines.

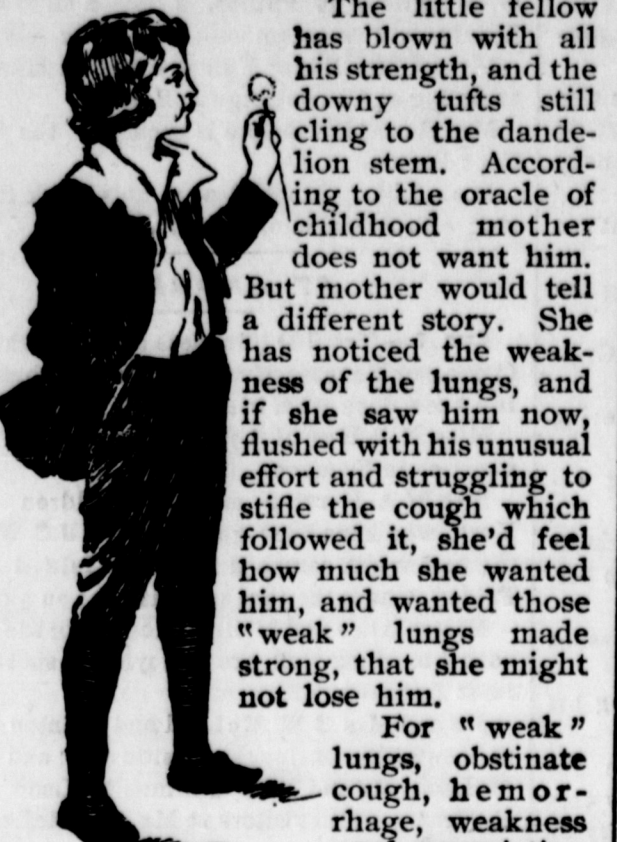
Mrs Laura Thurber of Freeport was in town Monday.
