Miss Tessa O'Brien and Miss Gertrude Ingram, of Houlton, are spending a few days here with Miss Fowler.

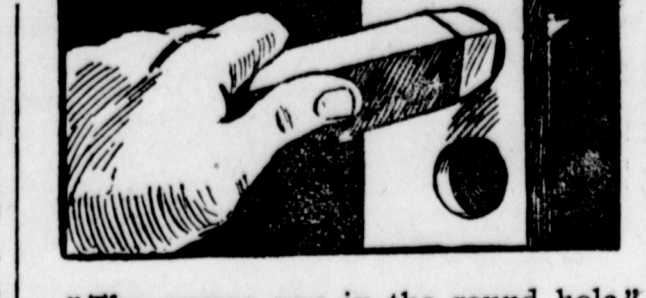
