The French Parliament reassembled October 22d. Under the menace of a general strike of coal-miners the socialist deputies passed motions for an eight hours day, a minimum wage for miners, and a pension of two francs a day after 25 years of work; but the ministry firmly opposed the propositions and was sustained in the Chamber of Deputies by a vote of 321 to 254.

The Pan-American Congress at the City of Mexico was formally opened October 23d, and Mr. Conaro Baigessa, chairman of the Mexican delegation, was chosen president. The first act of the congress was the adoption of a resolution urging the governments of Colombia and Venezuela to reach an equitable and fraternal adjustment of their difficulties.
