Miss Ma. J. Pagley of Amherst is the guest of Mrs Townsend.

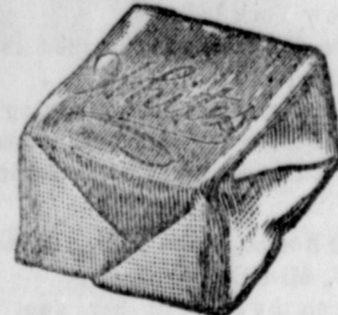
Mr Finlay of New York who has been spending several weeks with his cousin, Rev T. J. Butter and the Misses Butter took his departure on Tuesday.
