

CARLETON, January 29.
Last Friday night and Wednesday morning we had a most tremendous gale of wind from the S. E. attended with snow, hail and rain, which did considerable damage to the shipping in the harbour, almost all of which were drove on shore, but most of them were got off again, after the storm abated, several boats were sunk and otherways destroyed, two new frames, in King-street were blown down, but we have not heard of any lives being lost.

MRS. Morel, the wife of John Morel, is willing to testify, that Tyler Dibble, Esq. Agent to the Refugees, who received tea, sugar, &c. for the use of Refugees in districts, has issued the same to old inhabitants on the River St. John, people that were disaffected to his Majesty's government; and that he the said Tyler Dibble bought a certain tract of land of a certain Whitney, an old inhabitant on the River St. John, and paid part of the purchase with refugee cloth.
January 19th, 1784.

Mr WILLIAM LOWELL, near Major Island, being present on the 15th or 16th of September, 1783, when a conveyance was made by a certain Whitney, an old inhabitant of this River, to Tyler Dibble, Esq. who is styled an Agent to Loyalists, and who distributed the cloathing and other necessities to Loyalists, that the said Dibble paid Mr. Whitney aforesaid six guineas in cash, and some pieces of cloth and linen for the said land, which appeared to him to be cloathing belonging to the Refugees; and that he the said Caldwell, nor his wife or child never received any donation of cloathing, linen nor shoes, arms or ammunition, or any other thing of said Dibble, or any other person in Nova-Scotia, except one pair of shoes, two pair hose, and six yards linen, and five yards and three quarters narrow cloth. Given under my hand this 19th day of January, 1784.
