WHEREAS by a proclamation bearing date the fourth day of March 1785 permission was given to all loyalists residing in the United States of America to transport themselves with their effects to this province in any vessels, and whereas sufficient time has been allowed for persons of the above description to avail themselves thereof: I publish this proclamation by and with the advice of his Majesty's council, for the information of those whom the same may concern, hereby declaring that the permissions contained in the said proclamation shall from henceforth cease and determine and that in future every vessel which shall on any pretence whatever, enter the ports or harbours of this province, and be unfurnished with a legal register, or shall not be navigated according to law, will be deemed subject to forfeiture and be seized accordingly.

Given under my hand and seal at the City of Saint John, this second day of June in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and eighty six, and in the twenty sixth year of His Majesty's reign.

BERLIN, Feb. 20.

WE shall not be long deprived of the
satisfaction of again seeing our glo-
rious Monarch among us, who enjoys all
our affection and admiration. His Majesty
has declared, that being now perfectly re-
covered of his cold and rheumatic pains,
he will in a few days come to Berlin.

Vienna, March 31. By supreme orders
the Mint at Vienna is employed in making
new Golden Sovereigns, and to the other
titles of his Majesty, on the reverse is ad-
ded King of Jerusalem; the reason for this
addition is said to be to prevent the Greek
merchants from exporting those coins into
Turkey, as with that title the bankers at
Constantinople dare not have them in pos-
session.

It is reported that the court of Naples
has ceded the port of Brindisi to that of
Petersburgh; an acquisition that will be of
infinite advantage to Russia in case of a
war with the Turks.

Madrid, Feb. 18. It does not appear that
cordiality between our Sovereign and the
King of Naples, his son, is yet re-esta-
blished. The Neapolitan court has not
made the satisfaction demanded. The
change of the ministry of the King of the
Two Sicilies is not approved by our so-
vereign.

Feb. 19. The definitive treaty of peace
between France and Portugal is concluded,
under the mediation of his Catholic Ma-
jesty, whereby all differences between the
contracting parties on the coast of Africa are
terminated, and provision is made for ob-
viating all future disagreements.

Paris, March 5. Comte de Grasse, who
has been twice a widower, was a short time
since married to Mademoiselle Sibon, who
is about thirty years of age, and daughter
to the Maître Charge des Affaires at the
court of France.

L O N D O N,

April 2. The following interesting in-
telligence was received at the India House
from Bengal, on Tuesday morning, by a
packet which left Calcutta on the 11th of
November last: The engagement entered
into between Mr. Hastings, on the part of
the Governor-General, and the Nabob
Vizier, had been fulfilled in every part—
that is to say, the Vizier had paid up every
rupee of his balance, including the debt of
750,000l. and the monthly subsidy due to
the troops.—The provinces of Bengal,
Benares, and Oude, were in perfect tra-
quillity.—Madame Scindia preparing to
proceed to the Deccan; and hostilities be-
tween Tippoo Saib and the Mahrattas
lowerly expected, or actually commenced.—
Seven ships loaded from Bengal, and no
bills drawn upon the Company by the Go-
vernor-General and Council.—The re-
trenchments ordered by the Court of Di-
rectors had been carried completely into
effect.—The orders upon the Treasury bore
no discount; and the discount upon the
bonds had fallen to eleven per cent.

We also learn, that there was a mutiny
among the soldiers at Madras, on account
of arrears of pay, but, by the timely inter-
ference of the governor, it was quieted
before the packet sailed.

The packet has been but four months and
seventeen days on her passage from Bengal.

The death of Sir John Burgoyne is now
confirmed by official dispatch to the Court
of Directors; by his death the command of
the 19th regiment of Dragoons is vacant,
worth 3000l. per annum.

Letters from the Island of St. Vincent,
dated February 25, mention, that the vol-
cano on the summit of Mount Garou had,
during the course of the last month, burst
with uncommon fury, and destroyed a large
plantation in the neighbourhood.

The petty States of Barbary continue to
make the greatest part of the European na-
tions tremble before them; and the most
