A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS by a proclamation bearing date the fourth day of March 1785 permission was given to all loyalists residing in the United States of America to transport themselves with their effects to this province in any vessels, and whereas sufficient time has been allowed for persons of the above description to avail themselves thereof: I publish this proclamation by and with the advice of his Majesty's council, for the information of those who may have been misled by declaring that the permissions contained in the said proclamation shall from henceforth cease and determine and that in future every vessel which shall on any pretence whatever, enter the ports or harbours of this province, and be unfurnished with a legal register, or shall not be navigated according to law, will be deemed subject to forfeiture and be seized accordingly.

Given under my hand and seal at the City of Saint John, this second day of June in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and eighty six, and in the twenty sixth year of His Majesty's reign.

LONDON, Feb. 25.

THE Duke of York has been written to by a great perquisite, inviting him to spend the summer in England, with his cousin the Prince Royal of Denmark.

February 27. It is a *prima facie* evidence of the merit of the present ministry, that the nation prospers under their direction. Their opposers may cavil and rail at them as much as they please still the world will say, that they appear to be no undeserving servants of the public affairs flourish as astonishingly. We forbear to speak of the success of ministry in the line of finance; nor shall we say a word of their efforts as economical promoters of the national wealth. We shall only hint at the present flattering state of our commerce, which is to be ascertained from an enquiry into the present state of the British shipping, and of the advantages of British exchange in foreign countries. At this present hour our trading ships are more numerous than they were in the year 1774; and by exchange with foreigners we gain in almost every case 7 or 10% in the hundred.

Excerpt of a letter from Portsmouth, Dec. 29.

"Yesterday the extraordinary trial of the commander of his Majesty's cutter the Expedition, upon a charge exhibited against him to the Board of Admiralty by the deputy comptroller of Customs, came on to be tried on board the Queen, when the following sentence was pronounced:

"The court, pursuant to an order from the Admiralty, dated the 14th day of December inst. directed to the President, proceeded to try Lieutenant Charles Quyngham Crooke, commander of his Majesty's cutter, the Expedition, for disobedience of their orders, in having (alleged by a letter, dated the 16th of last month, by Mr. John Rushworth, the deputy comptroller of Customs to them) unlawfully imported and concealed a considerable quantity of spirits and wine, and having heard the witness produced in support of the charge; and by the prisoner his defence; and having maturely and deliberately considered the whole the court is of opinion, that it appears in evidence, there was a quantity of spirits and wine found on board the cutter, but not concealed; that one hundred and ten gallons of spirits appear to the satisfaction of this court to have been brought on board the cutter without the privacy or knowledge of the prisoner, by the people; that it does not appear to the satisfaction of this court, that the remainder of the spirits being about seventy-eight gallons, and the wines found on board were unlawfully imported by the prisoner. The court therefore upon the whole, are of opinion that the prisoner has not been guilty of the charge of disobedience of the orders of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and therefore discharged him to be acquitted; and he is hereby acquitted accordingly.

The decision of the Barons of the Court of Exchequer, in Ireland, on Wednesday last, established a great constitutional point—a point of much importance to every member of civil society, which was, Whether the power of granting assizes was annexed to the office of Attorney General? When they unanimously decided that it was not.

The above decision was occasioned by a bill filed by the present Attorney General, against a Captain Fitzgerald of Cork, unauthorized and unaided by any court, by virtue of which Captain Fitzgerald was imprisoned.

Yesterday Captain Hawkins and Lord Howe, had conferences with the king, on the subject of building ships of two decks, to carry heavy metal on the lower tier, and to rate as 80-gun ships, carrying proportionate guns on their upper decks, poop, quarter decks, and forecabin.
