A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS by a proclamation bearing date the fourth day of March 1785 permission was given to all loyalists residing in the United States of America to transport themselves with their effects to this province in any vessels, and whereas sufficient time has been allowed for persons of the above description to avail themselves thereof: I publish this proclamation by and with the advice of his Majesty's council, for the information of those whom the same may concern, hereby declaring that the permissions contained in the said proclamation shall from henceforth cease and determine and that in future every vessel which shall on any pretence whatever, enter the ports or harbours of this province, and be unfurnished with a legal register, or shall not be navigated according to law, will be deemed subject to forfeiture and be seized accordingly.

Given under my hand and seal at the City of Saint John, this second day of June in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and eighty six, and in the twenty sixth year of His Majesty's reign.

KINGSTON, April 8.

Yesterday arrived at Port-Royal, from the Bay of Honduras, and the Mulquin-fence, but left from Montego-Bay, his Majesty's ship Camilla, J. Hart Esq. commander.

Capt. Hart, fired an American schooner called the Britannia, Capt. Well, at Belles River, with 20,000 feet of mahogany on board.

By accounts from almost every part of the country, we are exceedingly sorry to learn that the uncommon drought, which has for a considerable time past prevailed in most of the parishes, have done great injury to the planting interest in general.

NASSAU, (New-Providence) March 11.

Extract of a letter from the Bay of Honduras, dated February 4, 1786.

With respect to our situation on the Mulquin-fence and in Honduras, we are at present in rather a precarious state. The Spaniards try the force by right of discovery, as well as by the last treaty of peace, belongs to them, and insist the article on that head, the fact, is so clear as not to admit of doubt, much less of dispute. But the British, it appears, are not inclined to understand it in the same point of view, in consequence of which misunderstanding, that business is now, and has been for two months past, under negotiation at the court of Madrid, but is very little expected to close, when it is supposed the shore will be given up, and a large extent of territory, in consequence, granted to the Honduras settlers. Thus, in my own opinion, is making a very inadequate compensation for so great a sacrifice. Here we are distressed by treaty to cut Logwood only, while at sea shore, they have the possession of the native Indians, and perhaps one of the small countries in the world for the growing of all plants in use between the tropics, and mahogany in the greatest abundance.

The present inhabitants of this settlement are sufficient to do more than supply the consumption of Great-Britain and her different markets of export, with mahogany and logwood; and when the principal of the
