

POSTSCRIPT.

ExtraB of a letter from Antwerp, June 17.

"The disturbances occasioned by the new Imperial ordinances in some of the Belgic provinces, are not likely to be ended quietly. While our Governors General hesitate in giving a positive and satisfactory answer to the States of Brabant, and seem anxious to gain time by procrastination, every thing is to be feared even in Brussels itself, where the people have been with the utmost difficulty restrained from committing excesses. On the 30th of May, a prodigious multitude assembled before the palace, threatening to proceed to the worst extremities, if Government refused to listen to the importunities of the States; but upon the Governors saying that they would annul and revoke all changes that had taken place in the political and civil administration of our provinces, they testified their joy in the most extravagant manner. The Deputies, on their return to their respective towns, were received in triumph. In this place particularly, the Bishop, who was returning on the 1st of this month with the Baron Van de Werff, Lord of Schil, had his horses taken out of his carriage, and was conducted by the principal citizens in great pomp, with the Brabant ribbon in their hats. The reception given to the Burgomaster della Faille, and Penonary Bom, was still more brilliant, on account of their vigorous endeavours to support the rights and privileges of their country. It was hoped that this good humour would prevent any disagreeable commotions, and that the people would peaceably wait for the Emperor's confirmation; but on their hearing that the officers appointed as Intendants of the Circles were in a Convent privately, they assembled on the night of the 15th in a multitude, and broke into this Convent. The Sieur Van Dilt, one of the Captains, the first Commissary Schorel, and all the others, had the happiness to escape. But the second Commissary, D. de Tol, who was endeavouring to get off in the disguise of a woman, was known by a young man; the Commissary offered him his purse, which the other threw in his face, and the mob coming up threw him on the ground, beat him, and would have killed him, if some of the Magistrates had not interposed and rescued him from their hands, conducting him to the City hotel; immediately after, a mob of about 17,000 persons assembled before the gates of the hotel, insisting that the Commissary should be committed to prison, which the Magistrates thought proper to comply with. But the mob, not satisfied with this, went to his house, which they broke into, and were proceeding to pillage, when they were dissuaded from this act of violence by the Dean of the Cathedral, who lived hard by. They next fell upon the houses of Messrs Stevens and Loebberg, who were obnoxious to them on account of a monopoly of butter and gun-powder, which they were accused of making; these two houses, and another, were pillaged entirely; and twenty others would have shared the same fate of it, had it not been for the interference of the Duke D'Artemberg, Baron Hove, and Abbe de St. Bernard, our Bishop, and some other persons of distinction, seconded by the Ecclesiastics of all orders, and some hundred bourgeois armed, who obliged the mob to retire. Their rage was chiefly excited by discovering in the convent a hall, prepared for the Assembly of the Intendants, a bureau of papers, and other things, which convinced them, that although apparently suppressed by the Governors General, they still hold their meetings as Intendants of the Circles. Yesterday three houses at Liege were stripped, and it was with some difficulty that the militia at Moulins prevented similar violence there."
