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UTRECHT, August 15.

THERE is every appearance of an alteration in the state of affairs with regard to the intentions of different foreign powers, respecting the disturbances in the Republic of Holland. We have received fresh confirmation, that the King of Prussia intended the march of his troops at the instance (as we have every reason to suppose) of the Court of France.

It is in agitation to form a second encampment of patriotic supplies near Leyden. The principal object of this proposed encampment will be the security of the interior parts of the province against the evil intentions of the Orange party, whilst of Woerden is for security without the gates. The Dutch army has assumed a respectable appearance: several corps from which desertions have been made are not only complete, but even augmented by the addition of ten men to each company. The third battalion of Walloon Grenadiers is filled with a rapidity almost astonishing; and the State has determined to raise a 4th battalion, which will be very soon on foot.

Aug. 16. The three provinces and a half which form the Assembly of the States General, have passed a resolution to interdict the exercises of the armed burghers in the March of Brinsde-dur, and entirely to abolish the first corps of their militia. We are not certain whether they will not find some difficulty in pursuing this intention.

LONDON, August 10—30.

THE following humorous circumstance happen'd lately in the vicinity of Charing Cross—Two ladies of considerable distinction stopped in a carriage at a jeweller's, one of them got out of it; the coach stood across the causeway. Some gentlemen wanted to cross to the other side and desired the coachman to move on a little—the fellow was surly and refused—the gentlemen remonstrated, but in vain. During the altercation, the lady came to the door of the shop, and foolishly ordered the coachman not to stir from his place. One of the gentlemen without hesitation, opened the coach door, and with boots and spurs on, went through the carriage; he was followed by his companions, to the extreme discomfiture of the lady, within as well as the lady without. To complete the jest, a party of sailors coming by, observed in their way, that if that was a thoroughfare, why might they not go through as well as the gentlemen, which the whole party actually did. The lady had some difficulty in getting into her carriage, as a mob was soon collected to enjoy the scene. We hope she will take the wholesome correction in good part, and in future will avoid being tedious of her consequence, to the violation of civility and common good manners.

Extract of a letter from Copenhagen, Aug. 6.

"The numbering of the people has begun in this district, and Deputies are sent to the Danish dominions in Norway to commence the same business. The Prince's yacht is now in the road, and his Royal Highness is expected to go on board tomorrow; he goes first to Sweden, then to Petersburg, and where else is not yet mentioned. The Greenland of 64 guns, Moen of 46, and Activeer of 24 guns, accompany him."

Extract of a letter from Warsaw, July 28.

"On the 22d of this month we had the satisfaction to receive our Sovereign here, after an absence of near five months. His Majesty was met by a number of the principal nobility, and entered the city amidst the firing of cannon, and every demonstration of joy, which is not the less because his Majesty appears to have suffered nothing in respect of health."

Extract of a letter from Nimwegen, Aug. 16.

"The Hon. Mr. Grenville (or as he is called here the Lord Grenville) after dispatching a messenger to Holland, set off this day for London, on

business of importance; his return is fixed for the 28th instant, or the 30th at farthest; by that time we expect to hear something of the determination of the States of Holland, in respect to the last proposals for an accommodation. It looks respectful, and forebodes well, that the States General are amongst the foremost to refuse the Prince to all his dignities; to pass an act of oblivion to all that has hitherto been done; and to restore peace and harmony to the Confederacy of the United Provinces, which is on the point of being broken by a faction who have views distinct from the public good. If a rupture should happen, there is an end to the sovereignty of the United States, on the present establishment for ever (which God forbid)."

Monsieur Calonne, the late French Minister, and against whom the Parliament of Paris presented one hundred and thirty articles of impeachment—is now safe in London.

According to letters from Berlin, the amity subsisting between Austria and Prussia becomes stronger and stronger: a person of distinction is arrived here, charged with dispatches from his Imperial Majesty, who met with a very gracious reception, and Count Hertzberg entertained him in the most flattering manner at his country seat. All these circumstances seem to forebode events of consequence from the union of their two Courts.

Advices from Berlin say, that an incognito visit is shortly expected at that Court from the Emperor of Germany.

The entries of British manufactured goods, for exportation to French ports, last week, is said to have amounted to 127,000*l*.

Yesterday morning a messenger arrived from Mr. Grenville, who is gone to the Hague to adjust the internal disputes of the States, the accounts received were, that every thing was brought to a state of accommodation, and that tranquillity began to be resumed between the different parties.

On Saturday last there was a Council held at the Marquis of Carmarthen's office, in consequence of the arrival of the Duke of Dorset from Paris.

Extract of a letter from Berlin, Aug. 7.

"The 18th of this month, the detachment of Artillery, destined for the army assembling in Westphalia, marched from hence with the Chasseurs on foot; they were followed the next day by five squadrons of the black Hussars of Eden. The reigning Duke of Brunswick is gone to Clevel, where he is to occupy the Ducal Castle, while he remains invested with the command of the army, which consists of twenty-three battalions of infantry, twenty squadrons of horse and two companies of artillery, to which has been added, the battalion of Nassau infantry. The King will set out on the 14th for the Review in Silesia."

The utmost that France engaged to do for Holland by their last treaty, was to furnish 12,000 troops, eleven ships of the line, and six frigates. But if these adhere to the letter of this engagement, and it was never known that they went further in any case, what will 12,000 troops do against the force of Prussia?—and as to the ships, they can only be of service in protecting their settlements abroad, which will never be attacked by Prussia.

Extract of a letter from Nimwegen, Express, Aug. 15.

"The Hon. Mr. Grenville, Private Envoy from the King of Great Britain to his Serene Highness the Stadtholder, is now here, ever since the 2d instant, and has daily conferences with the Prince, at whose court he is now lodged, and till his return to London which, it is conceived will not be long. The Duke of Brunswick is also arrived from Clevel. Councils are held frequently at the Ducal palace; where conjurers arrive and pass to Berlin, almost daily. Our last accounts from that capital signify that they work incessantly in the arsenal, to provide cartouch boxes, and other military paraphernalia. It is also reported that his Prussian Majesty has ordered his own camp equipage into Westphalia."

The Ultimatum of his Prussian Majesty acceded to, and approved of by the Prince and Princess, as proposed to the States of Holland, in the matter of mediating the present differences, are,

"1st. A recall of Military auxiliaries sent by the States of Holland to Utrecht."

"2d. The decision of the differences at Utrecht to be submitted to mediators, whose representatives shall meet in that city, and arbitration be finally acquiesced in."

"3d. The Province of Holland shall not force the other Provinces either by threats or otherwise, to annul the laws of the Regency."

"4th. The States shall revoke their placart to suspend the office of Admiral, and Captain General of the United Provinces."

"5th. The command of the Hague shall be resigned to his Serene Highness the Prince of Orange; as his right, in quality of Stadtholder, and Captain and Admiral General of the United Provinces."

"6th. The States of Holland shall solicit the return of the Princess of Orange, the King's sister, into the Province, as the only method of doing away the insult offered to the person of her Serene and Royal Highness at Schoonhoven."

"7th. Two Deputies, representatives of the States General shall be allowed to sit as mediators with each other persons as shall hereafter be agreed upon."

"8th. The mediators of all such sovereign powers as have to this day offered their services in the way of arbitration shall be thankfully accepted."

"9th. The representative of the arbitration shall meet at the city of Utrecht, or at Amersfoort, if more agreeable in six weeks, previous to which there shall be no army or armed force, otherwise than the accustomed civil power, burghers, &c. within seven miles of the place of arbitration."

"The real arbitrators shall be invited to and guarantee for ever the whole circumstances and articles of accommodation."

"11th. The Province of Holland shall return an unequivocal answer to this instrument in fourteen days either to the Marquis de Thulemeyer, his Prussian Majesty's Ambassador and Minister Plenipotentiary now residing at the Hague; or by Baron Rhede, the Ambassador from the States General of the United Provinces resident at the city of Berlin."

"There shall be at this proposed Congress of arbitration at Utrecht (or Amersfoort) a full recital of grievances, and full and formal redress, as the arbitrators shall seem meet, and a complete and total oblivion as to all matters of dispute, difference, &c. at and for ever after signing the arbitration, which shall be within three months at farthest after the first assembly of such Congress having met and produced their powers from the respective sovereign mediators."

"The Marquis de Thulemeyer lays these articles before the States of Holland, and a copy of them is also ordered to be presented to the President of the States General and the Ambassadors of certain Courts now resident at the Hague, who will transmit them to their respective Sovereigns."

The authenticity of the following intelligence is vouched for by a morning paper in the strongest terms:

"The French Court have given their ultimatum to England, Prussia, &c. in a manner highly satisfactory to all parties. They have also informed the Dutch patriotic party, that they cannot consistently interfere in their disputes, as their precipitation in suspending the Stadtholder from his
