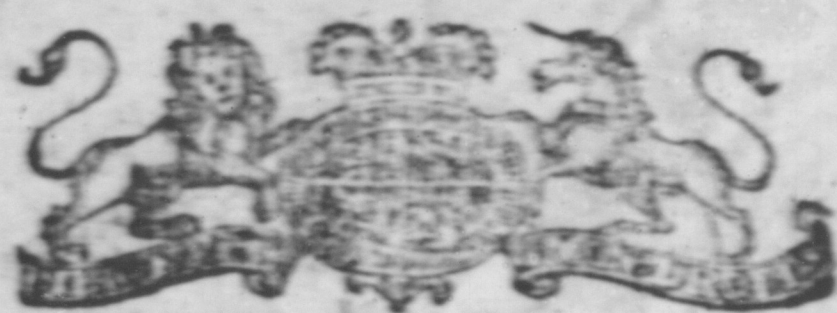

A PROCLAMATION.
THOMAS CARLETON.

HEREAS it is necessary from public emergency and to prevent distress to the settlers in this province the importation of the following articles be authorized and permitted for the supply of the inhabitants for a longer time; I have therefore thought fit, by and with the advice and consent of his Majesty's Council to publish this proclamation, and, by virtue of the power granted to me in and by an Act of Parliament, made and passed in the twenty-eighth year of his Majesty's Reign, entitled, "An Act for regulating the trade between the subjects of His Majesty's colonies and plantations in North America and in the West India Islands and the countries belonging to the United States of America, and between His Majesty's said subjects and the foreign Islands in the West-Indies." I do hereby authorize and permit

Horses, Neat Cattle, Sheep, Hogs, Poultry or Live-flock of any sort; FLOUR, RICE, or INDIAN CORN;

to be imported, by BRITISH SUBJECTS, in British built ships owned by his Majesty's subjects and navigated according to law, from any of the territories belonging to the United States of America, for and during the term of SIX MONTHS, from the date of these presents. And of this proclamation all persons whom it may concern will take due notice and strictly conform thereto.

GIVEN under my hand and seal at FREDERICTON, the TWENTIETH day of February in the year of our LORD one thousand seven hundred and eighty-nine, and in the twenty-ninth year of his Majesty's Reign.

WHEREAS I was so unfortunate as to suffer great loss in my property, by the misbehaviour of some citizens of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, who landed on the Isle of Seble, and wantonly pillaged and destroyed my house and effects, and thereby compelled me to leave the said Island, although my residence there was under the express licence and appointment of the British Government, (within the dominion of which the said Island is situated, and of which I am a subject) having been there settled by the Governor of Nova-Scotia, in order to relieve the unfortunate of all nations, who might be cast on said Island by distress at sea, and at the same time that both myself and people might be profitably employed in the Seal-Fishery.—And whereas by the direction of said Government, I applied for redress by memorial to the Honourable Continental Congress, who referred me to the Honourable Executive of said Commonwealth, with instructions to make full inquiry, and to grant me compensation at the expense of the United States.—And whereas I have received every attention from the said Executive that justice and the law of nations require, and all the compensation they could reasonably make, though I shall necessarily suffer from the event—I cannot, therefore, forbear to express in this public manner, the grateful sense I have of their goodness to me, and to acknowledge the humane regard which his Excellency Governor Hancock, and the Honourable Council paid to my memorial.
