

LONDON.

His Majesty's most gracious SPEECH is
but House of Parliament, on Saturday,
June 27, 1795.

My Lords and Gentlemen,
THE zealous and uniform regard
which you have shown to the general in-
terests of my people, and particularly
the prudent, firm, and spirited support
which you have continued to afford me
in the prosecution of the great contest in
which we are still unavoidably engaged,
demand my warmest acknowledgments.

The encouragement which my allies
must derive from the knowledge of your
sentiments, and the extraordinary exertions,
which you have enabled me to
make in supporting and augmenting my
naval and military forces, afford the
means most likely to conduce to the re-
storation of peace to these Kingdoms, and
the re-establishment of general tranquilli-
ty, on a secure, honourable and lasting
foundation.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,
I have to return you my hearty thanks
for the liberal and ample supplies which
the resources of the country have en-
abled you to provide, beyond all former
example for the various exigencies of
the public service.

I have also to acknowledge, with pec-
uliar sensibility, the recent proofs which
you have given me of your attachment
to my person and family. In the provi-
sion which you have made for settling
the establishment of the Prince and Prin-
cess of Wales, and for extricating the
Prince from the incumbrances in which
he was involved.

My Lords and Gentlemen,
It is impossible to contemplate the in-
ternal situation of the enemy, with whom
we are contending, without indulging a
hope that the present circumstances of
France may, in their effects, hasten the
return of such a state of order and regu-
lar government as may be capable of
maintaining the accustomed relation of
amity and peace with other powers. The
issue however, of these extraordinary
transactions is out of the reach of human
fore-sight. Till that desirable period ar-
rives, when my subjects can be restored
to the secure enjoyment of the bless-
ings of peace, I shall not fail to make
the most effectual use of the force which
you have put into my hands.

It is with the utmost satisfaction, that
I have received the advice of an impor-
tant and brilliant success obtained over
the enemy, by a detachment of my fleet
under the able conduct of Lord Bridport.

I have every reason to rely on the con-
tinuance of the distinguished bravery
and conduct of my Fleet and Armies,
as well as of the zeal, spirit and perseve-
rance of my people, which have been
uniformly manifested through the whole
course of this just and necessary War.

Parliament was then prorogued to the
5th August.

BASSETTERE, (St. Kitts) June 9.
Copy of the Log Book, taken on board his
Majesty's ship Thorne, R. W. Ormsby,
Esq. commander.

May 25, 1795.—Lat. 18. 52. N.
long. 65. 30. W.

At 5 A. M. saw a sail in the W. N. W.
made sail and gave chase, at Meri-
dian the chase gained upon us, started a
quantity of water and the wedges out of
her lower masts, perceived the chase to
be a French cruising ship, at 11 P. M.
came within gun shot of her, at a quar-
ter past, came to close action, yard arm
and yard arm; after a very smart fir-
ing, and several times falling on board
each other, at a quarter before twelve
the enemy struck, she having ten men
killed and twenty wounded; hoisted out
the boat and shifted the prisoners.—She
proved to be the Courier Nationale cru-
iser, commanded by Citreus Barre. On
examining our damages found five men
wounded, and rigging very much
damaged.

The Thorne left this island with the
newward bound fleet on the 25th ult.
and parted with them, all well, on the
evening of the 24th. The next morn-
ing we got sight of the French ship,
which she did not overtake till eleven at
night, when the action commenced, and
continued with great gallantry on both
sides for near three quarters of an hour,
when the French submitted to superior
bravery. The Thorne mounts 16 six
pounders, and the Courier Nationale 14
nine and sixes—the difference of two
guns in favour of the Thorne, was coun-

terbalanced by the superior weight of
metal of the enemy, which was a much
heavier ship.—The prize was sent to
Antigua and the Thorne arrived here on
Saturday last.

BOSTON, August 21.
Extract of a letter from Philadelphia,
August 15.

"The important question is decided
—The President has ratified the
Treaty, and delivered it to Mr. HAM-
MOND, who sets out for New York, to-
morrow, from whence he takes passage
to England, in a frigate.—Mr. BOND
will perform the functions of British
Minister in Mr. H's absence."

MEDUSA and AFRICA.
We learn from Newport, that the Me-
dusa was still lying in the harbour, and
the Africa, at some distance off, though
in sight of the town. The Medusa was
ready to sail for Bordeaux—waited on-
ly for a wind—and the officers were de-
termined, if they could not overhaul the
Africa, to engage her. The Medusa had
450 men—and was to take 150 passen-
gers for Bordeaux.

The following is a copy of a letter I
received from Capt. HOWE, of his Brit-
annic Majesty's ship Africa, which I
take the most early opportunity of for-
warding to your Excellency, having the
honour to be, with due respect and esteem,

Africa, off Rhode Island,
31st July, 1795.

SIR,
I did expect to have the pleasure of
seeing you on board the Africa; but as
that is not the case, I am obliged to send
an officer to you, under the present cir-
cumstances, and to define that you will
lay my letter before the Governor, or
other Chief Magistrate of the Island,

which is to contain these several requests.
First, That there may be delivered up
to me immediately, an officer who was
taken on board a British sloop, while in
Newport, and confined on board the
French frigate now in Rhode-Island;
these violent proceedings, being contra-
ry to the Law of all nations in a neutral
port.

In the 2d place, that you may receive
the aid of the Civil power in this Island,
to send on board the Africa, all British
or others, who have been captured in a-
ny vessels, and set at liberty in these
States; not a signed and pretended
aid, but such as our nation has a right
to expect from the United States: And
3dly,

That I may be permitted to buy such
refreshments as my ship's company are
in need of; and that in case I send my
own boats on shore, my people and offi-
cers shall not be liable to insults from a-
ny of the inhabitants, or others, of what-
ever description; and to represent in
plain terms to the Governor, that if my
officer who carries this letter, or any o-
ther officer or people whom I may send
upon these just and lawful occasions, re-
ceive from any one individual, whether
of the nature of a mob or otherwise, any
affront or insult, I will immediately come
in with his Majesty's ship under my
command, and protect my own people;
and further, that if the Government or
States here, are, in such cases as I have
mentioned, guilty of such a breach of
neutrality, I will then look upon myself
in the same manner, as not bound to ob-
serve the neutrality of these ports, and I
am resolved to be treated in the same
manner in all respects whatever, as they
do those of the French Republic.

And I am the more plain in the na-
ture of my present demands, as I have
received a hint, that if I send my people
on shore, while the Medusa lies at New-
port, that they will be considered as
spies. In this case I want to say nothing.
I am in full possession of every intelli-
gence regarding that ship, which I want
to be possessed of.

And I require a written answer from
the Governor of Rhode-Island to these
demands, and that without loss of time.
