PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 23.

Yesterday morning the remains of
Mr. Allen M'Kenzie, second Lieutenant
of the Ganges sloop of war, who fell in
a duel with Mr. Gale, first Lieutenant
of Marines, on Sunday last, were depo-
sited in the burying place of the First
Presbyterian Church. The following
address was delivered over the grave by
the Rev. Mr. Linn, a copy of which
we have obtained from the author:

"We are called to surround the grave
of a Soldier, who has fallen by the arm
of a brother soldier—the victim of mis-
taken honor. Slain in the prime of life,
his cold remains lie buried in that tomb,
and his budding honors are chilled by
an untimely fate. Were we to approve
of that action, that has laid him thus
low, we should speak in a manner un-
worthy of the christian, and of his sa-
cred character. Yet, while we censure,
we can pity. While we proclaim to
the world, our detestation of the horrid
custom of duelling; we here weep over
the fate of an unfortunate man, who
has fallen a victim to that custom. With
our tears, let the tears of his brother
soldiers be mingled; for notwithstanding
his late action, they attest that he
was brave.

"Here let all who are directed by a
false honor, behold its effects. Those
closed eyes shall no more open on the
light of day. Human things shall no
longer engage his attention. He has
taken a solemn departure from this
world; and dark and dismal are the
shades of night that descend upon his
tomb—before an awful Judge he has
gone to answer; and sealed for ever be
those lips that would dare to determine
his eternal destiny. With his God we
leave him—a God that is merciful.

"From this event let us learn a seri-
ous lesson. Let us learn to separate true
from false honor. Let us learn to sub-
due our passions, and to cherish the

flame of brotherly love. Let us learn
the shortness and uncertainty of life:
and above all, let us prepare for death,
and for eternity. Let us here bury our
immoderate attachment for the world.
Let us lay up our treasures in heaven."
