

but they were repulsed with very great loss. About two o'clock General Kray made a second attempt upon the enemy's left, while the Russians at the same time again endeavoured to penetrate the centre of the enemy's line. Notwithstanding the utmost bravery of the Allied troops, the French maintained their position. Most fortunately at this moment, General Melas arrived with sixteen battalions of Austrian infantry, attacked the enemy's right, which he beat back with difficulty. Having turned the flank of the enemy, he pursued his advantage, and got possession of Novi. The Russians immediately marched through Novi, supported the Attack of General Melas with great vigour, and the whole French line was thrown into confusion, and retreated in the greatest disorder:—The whole line pursued. Gen. Grouchi, commanding a division, endeavoured to rally his men, but in vain; he was taken prisoner. Three other Generals Colli, Bordonau, and Perignau, four thousand prisoners, thirty pieces of cannon, and 57 tumbrils, are the result of this victory. I fear the loss of the Allies must have amounted to near 5000 men.

I forgot to mention that General Joubert was killed, and that Moreau, who was present as a volunteer, has again taken the command of the army.

DOWNING-STREET, SEPT. 9.

A dispatch, of which the following is an extract, has been received from Lieut. Gen. Sir Ralph Abercromby, by the Right Hon. Henry Dundas, one of his Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

Head-Quarters, Schager Brug, September 4.

From the 7th of August to the 1st of September the troops continued to occupy the Sand-hills on which they fought. On that day the army marched and took post with its right to Petten on the German ocean, and its left to Oude Sluys on the Zuyder Zee, with the canal of Zuype in front.

A better country is now open to us. We have found some horses and wag-gons, and a plentiful supply of fresh provisions.

The troops continue healthy and behave extremely well.

The 11th regiment of dragoons are arrived, and have begun to disembark. The transports have been ordered to return to the downs.

I have the honour to inclose herewith a return of the artillery, ammunition, and Engineers stores, captured at the Helder.

L O N D O N, September 10.

We refer our readers to the London Gazette Extraordinary of last night, for an official account of the important victory gained over the army of General Joubert in Italy, as also to the Vienna Court Gazette of the 1st of August, published on the same subject, and to further details which appear in the German Papers, brought by the Hamburg Mails, three of which arrived yesterday: From all these accounts, which vary in some particulars, it will appear that the battle of Novi was one of the most dreadful conflicts that have taken place since the commencement of the present war.

The letter of Lord William Bentinck, which is written with the usual perspicuity of that nobleman, agrees with the accounts in the French Papers, in stating that Moreau again succeeded to the command of the French army after the death of Joubert, but General Melas speaks of Moreau as also mortally wounded; in this we believe the Austrian Commander must have been misinformed.

A French Paper was yesterday received in town, of one day later date than those from which we yesterday gave Extracts: its contents are unimportant.

The general belief on the Continent is, that Genoa is now in possession of the Allies, as also, that in consequence of the above defeat, all the plans of the French in Switzerland, and on the North of Germany, will be disconcerted.—It seems they have made a diversion on the Lower Rhine, where, however, they will have to contend with 40,000 Austrians.

The accounts of the late actions in Switzerland, appear to have been much exaggerated.

We learn by the Paris papers, that at length the venerable Pontiff of Rome has seen an end of his persecutions—he died lately in the south of France.

The Dutch letters continue to speak of the exertions making to resist the English, but are not of a sufficient late date to record the capture of the fleet.—See Extracts.

Accounts were yesterday received from the Texel, down to the date of the 6th instant, but nothing official from the army later than the 4th, at which time no particular event had occurred. If Alkmaar or Haarlem had surrendered, it must have been since the 4th.—See the Gazette of last night, and two Extracts of letters, which we have given under the head Expedition to the Texel.

The embarkation at Deal is nearly completed: it is supposed the Duke of York went on board yesterday.

It seems the Russian troops, which have arrived at Yarmouth, were more numerous than some of the papers of yesterday stated—a great number more are expected hourly.

BOSTON, September 28.

OF SURINAM.

Capt. Pierce, arrived at Baltimore, informs, that the British fleet took possession of Surinam, and its dependencies, August 20, stipulating, that no alteration should be made in the government;—that Dutch and American property should be inviolate; and that Americans should be permitted to trade there, but should be allowed to take in return produce to the amount of only one third of their cargoes, except molasses. The Admiral granted passports to the American vessels.

On the arrival of the British Squadron, the Captain of the corvette Hulsar, Capt. Pelatier, surrendered his ship to Com. McNeil who put an officer and upwards of an hundred men on board. An altercation took place between Com. McNeil and Ad. Lord Seymour, on the subject of the prize; the result of which was the surrender of her to the British, with all the prisoners.

Touissant is in possession of Cape-Nichola-Mole.

Capture of Surinam.

From Providence, Sept. 25.

Capt. Pitts, arrived here yesterday in twenty eight days from Surinam, brings intelligence of the capture of that place

by the English, with little or no resistance.

Turin, June 29.

F. M. Suwarrow has sent Gen. Kaim the following dispatch:—"Dear General, march against Coni, whither I will send you a reinforcement of 10,000 men, besiege the fortress and take it. Meanwhile I pursue the remains of Moreau's army who has retreated into the Genoese." Upon receiving this, Gen. Kaim put 300 waggons in requisition, and was preparing to march immediately.

This will in all likelihood cut off Moreau's retreat to Nice.
