HALIFAX, September 21.

On Thursday last the following affectionate Addresses were presented to His Royal Highness the DUKE of KENT:—

To General, His Royal Highness

The DUKE of KENT and STRATHERN, Commander in Chief of His Majesty's forces in British North America, Knight of the Most Noble Order of the Garter, and of the Most Illustrious Order of St. Patrick, &c. &c. &c.

The ADDRESS of His Excellency Sir JOHN WENTWORTH, Baronet, L. L. D. Lieutenant Governor and Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Province of Nova-Scotia and its Dependencies, and of His Majesty's Council for the same.

THE LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR and COUNCIL of Nova-Scotia, beg leave to approach Your Royal Highness with unfeigned congratulations on your return to this favored country, to exercise the military command, and to protect the loyal and extensive Provinces of British America; distinguished by Your Royal Highness's former residence.

In the liveliest terms of gratitude, we render thanks to that BEING who guides all events, for the restoration of Your Royal Highness's health, so peculiarly interesting to the people of this country.

At a period of innovation and anarchy in other parts, we are anxious to come forward with one heart and voice, to offer such testimonies of inviolable attachment to the King's Person, Family and Government, as may manifest our zeal for the unequalled constitution of His kingdom, the purity of its laws, and the justness of their administration:—And, should necessity occur, we prefer our lives and fortunes to support His Majesty's Government.

The times demand this public declaration; and, we wish, dutifully to cast our weight into the scale of order and obedience, so beneficial to the good of mankind, and so necessary to the tranquillity of the World.

We rejoice in the recent and decisive victories gained by his Majesty's Fleets, and the Armies of his Allies, whose brave commanders, by their professional skill and undaunted courage, under Divine Providence, have added safety and honour to their country.

And finally, Sir, we beg leave to express our heartfelt gratitude to our gracious Sovereign, for appointing Your Royal Highness to this command; which, we sincerely hope may redound as much to your Royal Highness's honour and glory, as it will reflect lustre to His Majesty's North American Dominions.

To His Excellency Sir JOHN WENTWORTH, Baronet, Lieutenant-Governor, and to the Members of His Majesty's Council, of the Province of Nova-Scotia.

The ANSWER of His Royal Highness the DUKE of KENT, to their Address.

I REQUEST that your Excellency and the Members of His Majesty's Council, will be assured of my grateful acceptance of Your congratulations on my return to Nova-Scotia, in a situation of so much confidence, as that to which His Majesty has been pleased to appoint me, and in which it will ever be my study to prove myself not unworthy of the trust reposed in me.

I am equally sensible of your polite attention in expressing your joy at my recovery from the effects of that accident which occasioned my return to England last Fall.

I shall not fail to embrace an early opportunity of communicating to His

Majesty, (by whom I am sure it cannot fail of being received in the most gracious manner) the very loyal terms in which you express your attachment to His Person, Family and Government.

No one can join more cordially than myself in the satisfaction afforded you, by the important victories gained by his Majesty's Fleets, and the brave Armies of his Allies, or in acknowledging the high obligations we are under to their brave Commanders for the repeated brilliant proofs they have given of their skill and courage.

Let me conclude, Gentlemen, by adding, how flattered I am in finding that my appointment to the Chief Command of His Majesty's Forces in British North America has given you pleasure, as also, how thankful I feel for the hopes you signify that this circumstance will redound to my honour and credit, and that I trust every one of you will be persuaded that my utmost endeavours will be exerted for the protection of His Majesty's Colonies in this part of the World, in the number of which, Nova-Scotia will ever claim from me a peculiar interest.

To His Royal Highness, PRINCE EDWARD, DUKE of KENT, Knight of the Most Noble Order of the Garter, and of the Most Illustrious Order of Saint Patrick; General and Commander in Chief of all His Majesty's Forces in North America, &c. &c. &c.

May it please your Royal Highness,

THE MAGISTRATES, the CLERGY, and the GRAND JURY, for themselves, and in behalf of the other inhabitants of Halifax, beg leave to approach your Royal Highness to offer their sincere congratulations, and to express their joy at your late return to Nova-Scotia.

The interest which they take in whatever concerns Your Royal Highness's glory and happiness, could not fail to render the distinguished Appointment which his Majesty has been graciously pleased to confer on you, a circumstance of the highest gratification to them, and to all his Majesty's Subjects throughout the Province.

We consider this event as a very flattering and substantial testimony of his Majesty's paternal regard and gracious attention to the happiness of his people in this quarter of his dominions, in again committing their protection to so illustrious a Character as Your Royal Highness; whose Princely and amiable Virtues have long endeared you to them, and whose military talents are so eminently qualified for the important trust.

From this arrangement, we anticipate the most beneficial consequences to the Empire at large; since, in addition to the local advantages and security which must naturally result from it, His Majesty's Provinces in America may reasonably expect to ascend to that importance, which their increasing population and prosperity, as well as their position and their maritime advantages on this Continent, gives them a fair claim, to, under his Majesty's wife and mild Government.

To Your Royal Highness's comprehensive mind and perseverance in acquiring an accurate geographical and political knowledge of these Provinces, and their true relative Interests, as parts of the British Empire, they are much indebted;—and we have the satisfaction to assure Your Royal Highness, that the Inhabitants of Nova-Scotia have a just sense of the consequence which the Province derives from the residence of Your Royal Highness in it.
